I guess the positive is that we don't have mice or snakes. Cat food keeps increasing my monthly feed bill. But it is okay because Rita loves those cats and just tolerates the cows. I don't believe I will ever make her a cowhand. Mom always said that she is a city girl!

Things at work have been very challenging with all the political changes, the costs of operating a business increasing, and the struggles of finding individuals that want to go to work. I personally have found it difficult to hire help for the farm. We have had to make adjustments in the way that we get our work done. I am praying that things will calm down and get back to the way it was several years ago. Our country needs individuals getting back to work.

Well today is a special day for me. My jogging log now reflects that I have ran 111,111 miles. This number doesn't come by accident. I knew that this will be the only time in my life that I have six numbers all the same in my running totals. It is hard to believe that I started running 44 years ago. I am so thankful that my good friend, Gary Comstock, talked me into running with him. I must be honest that it is at a slower pace and not near as easy to run now days. My fall last September has made it a little harder to do this daily. My running pace is slow and slower each year but I am going to continue as long as the Good

There will come a day that I stop working at DCAI. I am planning on working several more years so don't throw the party yet. Losing my eye sight has limited my ability to travel or go places on my own. This fact doesn't stress me because I will have my farm, cattle, cats, and Rita to take care of. I have never been a person to just sit around and do nothing. I love being outside in the fresh air and keeping busy. If I get bored I just walk to the fence and the cows come to me. Several of the cats go with me when I am feeding the cows or working outside. They feel like they need to supervise what I am doing. The cats love to go out in the pasture so the calves will lick and chase them. I love this! There is always something that makes me smile and appreciate where I am.

I have had a great life and been able to experience more than most. I contribute my success to my faith, the way I was brought up, my family, friends, and the people that I have worked with. I learned at a young age most of your success comes from the company you keep. I have always been surrounded by individuals with great talent. I want to thank you all for your love, friendship, and help along the way. I still need your help so don't stop now, it is always appreciated.

I must say that my priorities have changed the last several years. I have come to appreciate the simpler things in life. I no longer think about advancing my career, recognition, or becoming important. When I think back, I wonder why it was so important for me to take all the courses, get the educational degrees, and advance upward in a company. Don't get me wrong, I realize without that personal drive, I might not have ended up in Viburnum working for DCAI. All the experience and steps in my life have brought me to the place I am now. I am the happiest that I have ever been. I miss my family and friends daily but realize that they are looking for the peaceful life like I am. I hope you find it like I have!

#### ARE YOU READY TO VOTE?

- √ Register
- ✓ Photo ID
- √ Vote



Beginning with the **November** election, everyone wishing to vote in Missouri will be required to show photo identification (ID). A voter must have one of the following:

- a nonexpired Missouri driver's license
- a nonexpired or nonexpiring Missouri nondriver's license
- a photo ID issued by the Missouri National Guard, United States Armed Forces, or the United States Department of Veterans Affairs
- a document that meets specific requirements as written in state statute.

Individuals who do not have one of the above forms of identification can obtain a **FREE** nondrivers ID at any local Missouri Department of Revenue (DOR)

For your convenience, Viburnum License Office is located right inside the DCAI building. Office hours are 8:30am – 4pm, closed 12:30-1pm for lunch.

To obtain your free non-driver's ID bring any form of documentation with your current address to the DOR. **You must state you want the free ID.** It will not be asked. DOR will only provide one free ID to those obtaining it for the first time in order to vote.

If you do not have a certified birth certificate, the Missouri Department of Health and Senior Services, Bureau of Vital Records can provide a **FREE** copy of a certified Missouri birth certificate. For more information or to request a birth certificate, call (573) 751-6387 or email VitalRecordsInfo@health.mo.gov.

If you are not registered to vote, contact DCAI for assistance or go to https://www.sos.mo.gov/elections/goVoteMissouri/register for more information and to register.

DCAI encourages all people with disabilities to register to vote and obtain a photo ID, who may not already have one, to allow your voice to be heard in the upcoming local, state, and national elections.

Last day to register to vote in the November election is October 12<sup>th</sup>.





## Wolfner Library Services Overview

The Wolfner Talking Book and Braille Library is a division of the National Library Service for the Blind (NLS).

Wolfner Library provides informational and recreational materials in audio, braille, and large-print formats free of charge to Missourians who are unable to use standard-print materials due to blindness, visual or physical impairment, or a reading disability.



Audiobooks and magazines play on a digital talking-book player provided to the patron by the library. All library materials are mailed to and from the patron's home address free of charge through the U.S. Postal Service.


#### **Bard Services**

#### What is BARD?

BARD (Braille and Audio Reading Download) is a web based service provided by the National Library Service (NLS) that allows users to download audio and/or braille materials.

Authorized users can download audio books and magazines to a personal smart device or phone using the BARD mobile app. They may also download via the internet to a USB device to be played in a digital talking-book player provided by the library, a refreshable braille display, or an authorized third- party reader such as a Victor Reader Stream®.

All Wolfner patrons are eligible to use BARD! Simply contact the library to sign up for the service.


